

CHANCES' first XI team this year won the championship in the Midlands West Business Houses cricket league with a seven points lead over Stewarts and Lloyds—well done!



WE WONDER WHY

Some 400 balloons were released at the Fete held on 18th August and fourteen were picked up and returned. Of these fourteen there were nine in the three hundred serial numbers. When the balloons in the three hundreds were released did the wind change or was a new and better gas cylinder put into use? Those that were picked up landed at Belgium (3), Ostend, Coventry, Rugby, Bedford, Northampton, Northants, Buckinghamshire, Hertfordshire (2) and Essex.

Now made in likenesses of Sir Winston Churchill, huntsman John Peel, fisherman Izaac Walton, Dickens' Mr. Pickwick, and Rip Van Winkle, toby jugs are sought by collectors all over the world.

The name Toby was used originally to describe jugs or pitchers in the form of a seated male figure in a tri-corn hat, holding a beer mug on his knee. The hat was so fashioned that each corner formed a convenient spout. Toby usually had a genial face, and was dressed in full-length coat with low set pockets, broad waistcoat, cravat, knee breeches, stockings and buckle shoes.

Few of the earlier toby jugs have survived. When a genuine 18th century specimen comes on the market, it is quickly snapped up by a collector. Up to \$15,000 had been paid for rare specimens. Most complete collection in the world is owned by Lord Mackintosh, industrialist head of Britain's National Savings organisation.

Why are they called Toby Jugs? This is a mystery. But the name Toby was associated with toping and conviviality in Shakespeare's time, in the person of Sir Toby Belch. On the other hand, the name Toby Fillpot appeared in print in a song called "The Brown Jug," published in 1761.

It began:

"Dear Tom, this brown jug that now foams with mild ale,

In which I will drink to sweet Nan of the veil.

Was one Toby Fillpot, a thirsty old soul,

As e'er drank a bottle or fathomed a bowl."

It started in . . .

The Provident Society

All workpeople and many of the staff at Smethwick and Malvern are members of the Smethwick Glass Works Provident Society which provides for sickness benefit and death grants.

The history of Chance Brothers records that the work people had set on foot a sick club amongst themselves as far back as 1820. In 1841, William Chance desired to form a stable form of club to be called the Smethwick Glass Works Provident Society. In the early days one of the principle benefits was medical attention.

The Canteen

To have dining rooms within the works is an idea of old standing. In 1902 there was opened a messroom near the lighthouse works and in 1905 another unit was built near the offices. When the school buildings in the New Gree thoroughfare ceased to be used as schools, part of the premises were converted into Canteens which were opened in June, 1917. From time to time alterations were made. In recent years the dining rooms were modernised in 1958 and the kitchens in 1961.

Pension Funds

A contributionary pension fund was inaugurated in 1939 but the firm's custom of awarding pensions to old or disabled workpeople of long service and their widows appears to date its establishment from the year 1866, when regular entries in the Board Minutes book made reference to pensions granted. In 1900 the regulations made eligible for pension all men of twenty-five year's service and upwards and in 1914 the pensioners numbered one hundred and five.

Savings

Records show that as far back as 1841 the Company earnestly encouraged saving and in that year William Chance

started a saving club which was "intended to provide means to the careful and prudent, of putting by small weekly savings against the time of need." The Deposit Scheme was begun in 1889.

In 1961 a War Savings Association was established, whose object was to enable certificates to be purchased by weekly instalments.

The present schemes provide for (a) Personal Holiday Savings, (b) National Savings, (c) The Deposit Scheme.

Medical Services

The National Health services of to-day are so comprehensive that one finds it difficult to believe that in the last century there were no such facilities.

The Company first employed a surgeon in 1843 whose duties included daily attendance at the Works and to attend to employees' families at their homes.

The present Medical Centre building is a conversion of the Gas Decontamination and First Aid block built during the last war.

Recreation Club


Although cricket and football teams had been formed from time to time before world war one, it was not until March, 1926, that a Recreation Club was formed, and a wooden pavilion was built in 1927.

In 1939 a new and indeed handsome pavilion was built and this was modernised and extended in 1960.

Suggestions Scheme

The first scheme to encourage employees to make suggestions towards improved methods was introduced in 1905.

The foundations for the scheme have remained sound and in 1961 a total of £522 was paid out in awards.


